Newest Owatonna Business Under Construction



Founded in 1980, Renneberg Hardwoods began as a sawmill and logging operation. This year they are expanding locations with a new facility in Owatonna. Renneberg Hardwoods provides quality hardwoods from flooring to lumber, they follow a strict kiln-drying protocol to ensure first-class wood products.

The new building is being built on State Avenue. The 13,600 sq ft building will allow the company to better service and grow in southern MN and beyond. Mohs Contracting is constructing the building and the company hopes to be open by the end of the year. Their main operation is in Menahga, MN.

Sputtering Components Expansion

Sputtering Components is undergoing a major building expansion at its Owatonna, Minnesota facility, construction started in May 2025. This expansion will create new space for innovation, growth, and enhanced customer service, coinciding with the company's 25th anniversary and will be marked by a grand opening event. The project is expected to be complete the end of October.

MN's Paid Family Medical Leave Nears; Businesses Need Readiness

The new PFML program starts on January 1st and your business needs to be ready. PFML requires every employer in the state to offer up to 12 weeks of paid medical leave and up to 12 weeks of paid family leave (maxing out at 20 weeks total in a 52-week period) for all employees. Wage replacement is partial, and job protection after 90 days from date of hire.

The program will be administered by a new state agency within the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED), unless an employer substitutes an equivalent private plan. Over the next 4 months, the chamber in partnership with the Minnesota Chamber will be providing information to our members on the requirements. You can also find them online at mnchamber.com

Housing Development Gets City Approval

The City of Owatonna has agreed to carry some development costs in order to get the project off the ground. The Mineral Springs Estates has been in the works for a couple years. The project is in conjunction with Prairie LaSalle Partners out of Chicago, IL. The plan phase 1 includes 36 lots and 13 outlots just east of River Springs Waterpark. There are 4 planed phases to complete the 82-acre development.

The City will carry the cost of hard surfacing streets, curb and gutter, and sidewalks for up to 5 years or until the lot is sold then will get that portion of the investment back. It's part of an ongoing plan to increase the number of single-family houses to fuel continued growth.

How Owatonna sees itself: Becoming a destination

For decades, Owatonna—considered a friendly and prosperous community along I-35—was a hidden gem. And while Owatonna still occasionally wins accolades like one of the "8 Most Overlooked Minnesota Towns For 2025" from places like World Atlas, over the last 25 years a quiet transformation has taken place. The city has stopped seeing itself as just a stop along the way and has begun to embrace its powerful identity as a tourism destination. This strategic shift has been driven by a combination of long-standing community assets, community-wide branding and a new, data-driven approach to growth.

The Foundation: The Steele County Free Fair

Owatonna's tourism success began with an event that has been a tradition for generations: the Steele County Free Fair. Far from just a local gathering, the fair is a regional economic powerhouse, contributing an estimated \$3.3 million to the local economy. The average attendee comes from over 30 miles away, and out-of-state visitors show strong attendance from nearby states like lowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, and South Dakota. Fairgoers are deeply engaged, spending an average of 3 hours at the fair and returning for an average of two visits during the event, showing strong loyalty and repeat engagement.

Building on this success, Owatonna has begun a new chapter. The recent Model T Ford Club International Tour is a perfect example of the city's ability to host major, multi-day events. The success of the tour was a direct result of strong community collaboration and partnerships and building on successful, and popular local events like Main Street's Downtown Thursdays, and with partners like the Steele County Historical Society, Little Theatre of Owatonna and the City of Owatonna's Park and Recreation. In addition to host venues, the support of local businesses and community leaders, proves we are taking our tradition of hospitality and applying it to new, exciting initiatives.

Owatonna is strategically growing its digital footprint leveraging the branding initiative set forth by community partners beginning in 2023.
